We urge you to give this matter your immediate attention.

As a result of a quality assurance review and subsequent investigation of the airmen medical certification activities of Senior Aviation Medical Examiner Robert Kurrle, M.D., over the previous five years, there is reason to believe that the medical certification examinations conducted by Dr. Kurrle during this period were not conducted in accordance with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) standards. Thus, the FAA has reason to question the medical qualifications of the airmen issued medical certificates by Dr. Kurrle during this period, and reexamination of the affected airmen is necessary in the interest of safety.

Your Application for a Medical Certificate and Physical Examination performed on [FILL IN - Date of Exam] has been identified as one in which the physical examination performed by the Aviation Medical Examiner may not have been conducted in accordance with FAA standards.

Therefore, under the authority of 49 USC \$ 44709(a) and 14 CFR \$ 67.413(a), the FAA is reexamining your qualifications in order to determine whether you meet the medical standards for a medical certificate.

In order to determine whether you meet the medical standards, you <u>must</u> submit a new application for a medical certificate and undergo your physical examination within 60 days of the date of this correspondence. To submit a new application for a medical certificate, you will need to visit the FAA website (medxpress.faa.gov) and electronically submit a new application for a medical certificate. After submitting a new application, you will need to schedule an appointment with a different Aviation Medical Examiner than Dr. Kurrle for a physical examination. After the physical examination, request the Aviation Medical Examiner to transmit your application and physical examination to the FAA's Oklahoma City, OK office in a timely manner.

All expenses incurred in establishing eligibility for a medical certificate are the responsibility of the airman, not the FAA.

At this time, your medical certificate has not been denied, suspended, or revoked. However, if you do not receive a new physical examination with a new AME within 60 days from the date of this letter, your certificate may be referred to FAA legal counsel for legal enforcement action in accordance with 14 CFR § 67.413.

We also invite your attention to the provisions of 14 CFR § 61.53, which prohibits airmen holding FAA-issued medical certificates from operating as pilot in command or as a required pilot if they know or have reason to know that they have a medical deficiency that makes them unable to meet the
